THE MADRAS CANTEEN SIDES

Small Sides - Thudakam Chilli Pakoda

The ubiquitous "bhajji" is ever-present in Chennai – as a starter, with mains, as a snack-stuffed with spiced potatoes and batter fried- with a hint of spice

Mini Vadai

Lentil dumplings, deep fried and served with coconut chutneys

Pepper Mushroom Fry

Madras style mushrooms – tossed with black pepper, onions and bell peppers

Madras Potatoes

Another of our favourites- Baby jacket potatoes with heaps of south Indian spices and herbs

Fried Masala Idly

The Madras Canteens' take on the classic savoury steamed rice cake – we fry it and toss it with our special canteen masalas

Masala Fish Fry (Per Piece)

Chennai style - Pan fried fish, marinated with Chennai masalas and heaps of spice

Chicken Lollipop

What can we say – crispy batter fried chicken, a classic with a glass of chilled beer

Chicken 65

Devised as a dish that was innovated for Indian soldiers, it has attained legendary status – chicken fried in a spicy, crispy batter and tossed with classic spices

Meen Pollichathu

This Kerala style classic dish - fish, marinated and cooked in a banana leaf

The Canteen Shredded Lamb

Shredded Lamb Shoulder, batter fried to a crisp and tossed with loads of spices

Meat Sides - Iraiccikal

Who says Madras cuisine is about vegetarian food; there is a rich tradition of cooking and serving meats that are cooked in a typical way that is very unique to the region.

Madras Chicken

As classic as it gets –boneless chicken, black pepper, coconut and spice and all that is nice

Chicken Masala

Chicken on the bone, cooked with our classic aromatic Chennai masalas

Yellow Chicken Curry

Homestyle chicken curry – a mild gentle curry, done with chicken breast that is rich on the palate

Plain Dosa

Fermented rice pancakes, no meal is complete without this; accompanied with 3 chutneys

Vegetarian Sides - Saivam

The tradition of vegetarian cooking is a very old tradition and and cooking style these curries is very healthy and nutritious apart from being extremely flavorful. At the Madras Canteen, we definitely recommend that you try at least one vegetarian dish with your meal.

'Kai" Curry Kurma

The Mix vegetable Kurma is a classic dish that has its own uniqueness which comes from the coconut, fennel seeds, cashew nuts and yoghurt in it. Of course, there is a secret ingredient added to give it a Madras Canteen feel.

Tamarind Okra

Such a grandmother' classic - Okra in a tamarind base - spicy and as classic as it gets

Amma's Mix Vegetables

Homestyle mix vegetable - mother's (Amma's) recipe cooked in a classic and coriender base

Shredded Cabbage Foogath

Foogath is a Goan term that originated from the Portuguese phrase "Refogar" which means "to fry with oil or butter and seasoning". Shredded cabbage, coconut, curry leaves and mustard seeds.

Potato & Eggplant

The working man's veggie options - Potatoes and eggplant in a classic peanut base – spicy.

Salem Sambhar

The lentil concoction that is famous as it gets in South Indiadone like a stew, with lots of vegetables and a tamarind tang.

Dal Spinach (Kirai)

Yellow lentils cooked with spinach- the tempering is the key.

Rasam

The history is as interesting as the dish itself is, concocted in hope of a bag of gold from the king – a fiery soup that is made from lentils, black pepper and gooseberries – cooking this one is an art.

Desserts - Madhuram Gulab Jamun

The classic caramelised cottage cheese dumplings – in a honey sweet syrup.

Rasgulla

It takes true skill to get this right – cottage cheese cooked in sugar syrup.

Kulfi

The Indian ice cream.

Steamed Idly

Steamed rice cakes, served with 3 chutneys and sambar

Idyappam

Rice string hoppers - Classic accompaniment to every meal

Chapatti

(per pc.)
